CHAPTER AND MEMBER NEWS

George Wilkes Peabody

Congratulations on being a member of SAR since October 23, 1939. That is almost 73 years of membership in our patriotic organization.

George grew up in the Los Angeles area. He earned an AA degree in Mechanical Technology at the Pasadena Junior College. He then went to work for Lockheed Aircraft Company in Burbank. When WWII broke out in 1944, George joined the U.S. Marine Corp. to keep out of the cold of Europe, hoping to find his dad and uncle who were captured by the Japanese in the Philippine Islands, and to prove himself. A rifleman in a combat patrol during the battle for Iwo Jima, on Volcano Island south of Japan, George was critically wounded, wrapped up in plaster and gauze body cast, issued a Purple Heart medal, and sent home, never afterward to see the Philippine Islands, his dad or his uncle.

George has been honored for fifteen years of active service with the Boy Scouts of America and eleven years with the 4-H club. Both the El Dorado Historical Society and the Heritage Association of El Dorado County honored George for meritorious service in the preservation of our heritage and history, and the El Dorado Forum's board of directors selected George to receive the Distinguished Citizen Award for historical contributions to El Dorado County.

An active charter member and historian for the El Dorado County Committee on the Bicentennial of the United States Constitution, George participated in the "Rock Across America" project which provided the mariposite stone for the State of California to the "Fountain of Freedom – Constitution" monument in Philadelphia, and transported the stone, along with the stones from several other western states, to their destination. He served as chairman of the Constitution Tree Committee which selected and publicly dedicated the Bankers' Tree, a huge Ponderosa pine tree south of Kyburz. He was Chairman of the U.S.S. Placerville Committee which publicly dedicated that World War II submarine chaser for its action in defense of the Constitution. Both the tree and the sub chaser were honored with special cancellation marks arranged by George. He has been responsible for all newspaper announcements and articles written for the Bicentennial Committee through 1991. If all of these accomplishments were not enough, George is also his family's genealogist.

Let's say it has been a full and productive life. George, we wish you many more to come.



Public Service Awards for 2012

Suzanne Gazzaniga and David H. Tellman, of the Placer County District Attorney's office, are both receiving the SAR Law Enforcement Award. They successfully researched and prosecuted a "cold case" which led to the conviction of a former deputy sheriff. The crime occurred on September 8, 1982 when Janet Kovacich disappeared. In October 1995, a skull was found in Rollins Lake when it was partially drained for maintenance. It could not be identified as Janet's. New information was received in 2003 as a result of media coverage. In 2006,

more sophisticated DNA techniques were used and a positive match was made in February, 2007. Detail after detail was presented to a jury; and on January 27, 2009, Paul Kovacich was convicted of the murder of Janet Kovacich, who disappeared 26 years earlier. Susanne Gazzaniga was elected a Placer County Superior court Judge in the June 2012 election.

Captain Joseph Tuoto III of the Roseville Fire Department is receiving the Sons of the American Revolution EMS Award. Captain Tuoto became the “go to” person for EMS supplies, research and development and training. He became the Fire Department’s first Continuous Quality Improvement Coordinator and was instrumental in developing many programs within the EMS division.

Battalion Chief Kathy Finney of the Roseville Fire Department is receiving the Sons of the American Revolution Fire Safety Award. Chief Finney has been instrumental in developing and implementing various safety practices within the Roseville Fire Department over the last fifteen years. Her work has helped prevent many accidents.

Scott Teuscher, a Federal Express truck driver, is receiving the Sons of the American Revolution Heroism Award. On July 12, 2012, he came upon a crash between a car and semi-truck on Highway 20 near Grass Valley. When he arrived at the scene, he thought that everyone was out of the vehicles. When he asked if everyone was alright, he was informed the truck driver got out. When he asked about the driver of the car, those at scene said that they did not know. The car was on fire and fuel was starting to leak from the tank of the semi-truck. Scott then ran to the car, pulling the unconscious driver from the car just 30 seconds before it exploded into flames. The woman was taken by helicopter to a local hospital trauma center.

The current supplemental charge is \$40 for National and \$10 for California. If you are thinking about getting a supplemental for another patriot ancestor, you should do it now. National is assessing changes in the charges for supplemental applications and the costs of reviewing them is at least as much as the \$80 charged for a new member's application review. Most prospective members will submit their easiest ancestor to prove and leave the more difficult ones for later. I know that I did.

A new CASSAR Life member schedule was established for those who want to prepay their State and Chapter dues and not have to bother with the annual dues payment for the State and Chapter. The chapter would receive \$10 from the trust fund annually for each life member to cover the chapter dues. This is seen as an advantage to dual members from other state societies.

2017 -Knoxville, Tenn. has submitted proposal


2018- Texas has expressed interest

Lincoln Proclaims Thanksgiving

Very few people probably think of Thanksgiving as a national holiday that was started in gratitude for the Union Army victory at Gettysburg. Although George Washington, leader of the revolutionary forces in the American Revolutionary War, proclaimed a thanksgiving in December 1777 as a victory celebration honoring the defeat of the British and the surrender of British General Burgoyne at Saratoga, it was not an event that was held annually. It was very common during this period in the 1700's for a day of thanksgiving to be designated in honor of a military victory, an adoption of a state constitution or an exceptionally bountiful crop.

It wasn't until October 1863 that President Lincoln, in a speech written by Secretary of State William Seward, declared that the fourth Thursday of every November would be an official U.S. holiday for Thanksgiving. (This article was on the Bugler Newsletter, www.paradestore.com .)

Experiencing America's Founding in Philadelphia

September 17th marked the 225th anniversary of the adoption of our nation's Constitution. Philadelphia was the center of a 3-day celebration. The Philadelphia SAR chapter sponsored a parade by our national SAR Color Guard across the historic mall from Independence Hall to the national Constitution Center. It was a beautiful parade, with 108 color guardsmen from all over the U.S., and about 40 wives. The visual experience of all these people in Revolutionary garb, with the men carrying flags of the Revolution and state flags was spectacular. Cyndy and Keith Bigbee joined us at the parade. Our group arrived in Colonial dress about 2 hours prior to the parade. You would simply not believe how many people from around the U.S. and the world had their photos taken with us during that time. We would be standing somewhere, and someone would come up with a camera, then 10 more cameras would come out. When this happened with a group of French tourists, we thanked them for their help during the Revolution.

Conni and I took the opportunity to combine this trip with a week-long exploration of Revolutionary War history in the Philadelphia area, as well as a little exploring of my ancestors' participation. We joined SAR friends from Texas and Missouri to see many Revolutionary War sites in the area. Here are some highlights:

- At Washington's Crossing state park, where Washington crossed the Delaware, we participated with our state Color Guard Commander Jim Fosdyck and his amazing wife UnHui in a grave marking where 22 of Washington's troops who died there have markers. Only one is known, the other 21 are unknowns.
- At Valley Forge national historic park, where Washington and von Steuben wintered with their troops and trained them, we toured the battlefield and obtained information about Ron's ancestor who wintered there as quartermaster of some of the Virginia Continental troops. Amazingly, 3 of the 7 people in our group of 8 found information on ancestors who wintered there.
- We visited the Old Barracks in Trenton, NJ, where some of the Hessian troops were staying the day of the surprise raid by Washington's troops on December 26, 1776.

- In Old Town Philadelphia, we visited the Betsy Ross House, the Second National Bank Portrait Gallery, where many famous portraits of founders are located, Independence Hall, the Constitution Center, and numerous other wonderful historic sites. At the Constitution Center, we saw an original Dunlap Broadside of the Constitution which was on display for a week.

In addition to the parade on Saturday, another highlight of the trip was dinner on Friday evening. We were met by a young man with a large backpack who met us and told us he was our guide. As we walked with him to the City Tavern, where many of the founders would discuss their ideas informally, we were stopped by a man in 1770s clothing who seemed in a panic. He was John Dunlap, who was looking for Thomas Jefferson. It seems that Mr. Dunlap was the printer for the Continental Congress, and he needed the draft of the Declaration of Independence that he was to be printing. Mr. Dunlap looked at us and said “You are dressed rather queer....are you for King George?” We also quickly answered NO in loud unison. He asked where we were going, and when we told him City Tavern, he decided to join us to look for Mr. Jefferson.

When we reached the tavern, we were served food of the 1770s and ales by a tavern wench. Dunlap excused himself to look for Jefferson, and Jefferson of course then joined us. Jefferson was also puzzled by our dress and asked us if we were for the King. When we quickly said NO, he told us about the politics and drafting of the Declaration, and said he had been chosen to write it because he is a better writer than a speaker. Then he told us “I need to find that printer Dunlap.” When we told him we had just seen him, he said “If you chance to see him again, inform him that I can be found at the Pennsylvania State House [today we know it as Independence Hall]. I bid you good eve.”

Dunlap of course returned, and when we told him Jefferson has just left, he said he had to go off to the State House to find him. Dunlap invited us to follow him, and said he might be able to talk the night watchman to let us in, too. When we reached the State House, he and the guard had a little argument, but eventually they let us all in. We had the chance to look at the hall itself, then we heard some arguing and saw Messrs. Jefferson and Adams walking down the stairs having a heated discussion, apparently about the language in the Declaration. The 2 continued for a while, then suddenly, a gentleman who had been sitting in a corner apparently sleeping made a loud tapping noise with a cane. The man arose from the chair, and lo and behold, M. Franklin began gently lecturing Jefferson about the language he had used in his draft and why the changes needed to be made. Mr. Jefferson then conceded. It was indeed a wonderful experience to witness some of our most important founders in their discussion. We heartily recommend that if you visit Philadelphia, you take advantage of the opportunity to participate in one of these dinners.
